




## 1. ROLE OF JOURNALISM IN FIGHTING CORRUPTION - A CASE STUDY: GLOBAL ASBESTOS TRADE (ICIJ AND BBC)



#### Impact:

- Extraordinary reach: tens of millions of people in 150+ countries, covered by 250+ news outlets, blogs and websites in at least 20 languages
- critical role in educating and alerting policymakers and workers
- key findings used to advocate for asbestos bans in Brazil, India, Mexico, etc.
- Canada: opposition leader called for a ban on exports → online campaign with 7,000+ letters
- counterattack by asbestos lobby → sign of being a credible threat
- two top level convictions in Italy: 16 years in prison for killing more than 3,000 people
- Columbia U's 2011 John B. Oakes Award for Distinguished Environmental Journalism and a medal from Investigative Reporters and Editors



Percentage of business people who believe that investigative journalism would be an effective way to stopping corruption in the private sector:





### Newspaper readership and control of corruption



### Internet users and control of corruption



### Media freedom and control of corruption







"Media exposure in itself is not sufficient to end corruption"

Uslaner, E. M., 2008

- impact of watchdog journalism blunted by ineffective governments, bureaucratic cultures, courts incapable of punishing wrongdoers, and a disempowered or disinterested public.
- Corruption is resilient because officials become adept at substituting alternate forms of malfeasance or otherwise adapt to reforms so they can continue to benefit from graft
- STILL! High-impact investigations can build street cred where cynicism and apathy rule. Investigative journalists accustom officials to an inquisitive press. Over the long term a culture of official accountability takes root





2015 FREEDOM OF THE PRESS DATA






### The Global Average Press Freedom Score Has Declined Sharply Since 2004






Sunday Times, 14 June: "British spies betrayed to Russians and Chinese":

- 1 million of classified documents "stolen" by Edward Snowden being "cracked" by Russian and Chinese secret services.
- As a consequence, MI6 agents had to be pulled out of live operations.
- Snowden has "blood on his hands"
- Citing anonymous senior government sources, senior Home officials and Western intelligence agencies

### 3. ACCOUNTABILITY IN JOURNALISM

### - SO WHAT IS IT AFTER ALL?



7 aspects have been identified by Aidan White, the General Secretary of the International Federation of Journalists:



- 1. To help build trust between journalists and the public to ensure that media can resist political and economic pressure
- 2. To advocate journalistic independence and media freedom in society
- 3. To promote the right of the public to be informed
- 4. To campaign for conditions that will enable journalists to serve their public better
- To foster better understanding in society at all levels about the role played by independent journalism in democratic life
- 6. To support journalists in their work and to encourage professional solidarity
- To mediate complaints from the public in a transparent service, free of charge and to provide remedies for unethical conduct by journalists


